

One day Jesus was praying in a certain place, and when He finished, one of His disciples said to Him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples."

One of the most important things in the Christian life is prayer, so learning how to pray should be our upmost desire. Prayer is not some great secret, nor is there a set way to pray, but prayer is just a time where we can actually talk, in the most intimate way, with the God that created the world. Isn't that an amazing thought? Prayer is where we learn to talk to Him, understand Him, connect with Him, while learning to understand ourselves. Prayer gives us untapped power, for it unlocks, ignites, heals, transforms, empowers, and brings calm to our hurried lives.

Obviously there are many more, but here are three simple reasons why we should pray.

- 1) Prayer attracts God: Psalm 66:16---20. When we deal with the sin of our heart, Christ listens to our prayers and acts on our behalf. What things do you need to release to God and His forgiveness?
- 2) Prayer unlocks us: Psalm 32:1---7. Prayers unlock us, but only when we pray truthfully and acknowledge the issues that are in our lives. We need to come clean to the Lord, for doesn't He already know our situation and heart? Who do we think we are fooling? But we need to do what always improves upon any broken relationship; we need to acknowledge that there is

a problem. When we keep silent, we lose strength and our guilt remains. When we pray honestly, we are energized and God brings us confidence, trust and freedom. Prayer refocuses us by taking our eyes off of us, and on to God. Real power comes from God in prayer. What do you need to pray more honestly about?

3) Prayer transforms others: Job 22:27---30. Praying for others changes the course of their life. They may not even know why, but it's true. Our prayers can give others courage, influence their decision-making, and can change outcomes.

First and foremost, I want you to know that prayer is just simple conversation with God. It is enjoying the pleasure of His company. If you do not know how to pray, ask God, just like the disciples did long ago. Prayer is simply you pouring out your heart to your Father who loves you. He knows you intimately. He cares about the minutia of your life, and He wants to hear all about it. But you have to decide to come away with Him and talk with Him, just like you would any other person you want to spend time with. But you don't have to conjure up some kind of big weighty prayer life. No, just ask God to build you and your prayer life. Let Him do it. And as you ask, He will answer. He will build you a prayer life that is filled with power and glory.

One last question: How devoted have you been in your prayer life every day, and how can you start to pray differently?

LU FROST

I was born and raised in Burma (now called Myanmar). I am the third generation of Christians on my mother's side, and second generation on my fathers. In Burma, only 4% of the population is Christian, and most of them are from the northern hill tribes that are ethnically similar to my people. The other percentages of religions in the country include 82% who are Buddhists, and the rest either follow Hinduism, are Muslim, or the Jewish faith.

A little more background on myself, I am not Burmese, but one of the ethnic groups called Kachin, which is in northern part of Burma (15,000 ft. above sea level, also known as hill people). I was born in that part of the country and lived until I was 8 years old, moved to Rangoon (Yangon), which is the capital of the country. The Burmese Military Dictatorship, which rules the country, often persecutes the Christian ethnic groups. This persecution makes it difficult to live in your own country.

As you might think, I was a typical Asian kid, who was encouraged to study and to do many activities. My studies included an undergraduate degree in Mathematics, while at the same time I studied theology at the local seminary. After I graduated from college and seminary, I worked at a large Kachin church as a children's minister that had more than three hundred children.

I came to the United States on July 28th, 1998, moving to Philadelphia for further study. I studied at the Philadelphia Biblical University in Biblical Studies. After that I moved to Pasadena, California to obtain my Master of Art's degree in Theology at Fuller Theological Seminary. During my studies there, I worked at the First Baptist Church of Pasadena in the children's ministry. After I graduated from Fuller, I worked as a social worker, but at the same time I continued to work at the church as a part time children's minister, youth minster, women's minister, and finally became a licensed minister at Oneonta Congregational Church in South Pasadena.

I met James at the courthouse in which he worked as a deputy sheriff and we got married after we dated two years. We got married on December 12th, 2009. For the last five years I worked in the

corporate world, but once again worked along side my husband in ministry as the youth director at Grace Presbyterian Church of Temple City.

James and I are so pleased to be here with our new church family, and are so happy at how you all have so warmly accepted us into your hearts.


YOUTH & ADULT MOVIE NIGHT

PRAYER CARDS

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

As the above verses from Matthew state, it is vital for us to get the message of the gospel out into the world, and especially our individual communities. This is where our prayer cards come in. It may be difficult for some of us to share our faith, but it is easy to pray for someone. Make a list of people that you will commit to pray for, that live within a ten---mile radius of the church. Pray that God gives you opportunity to share your faith with them and invite them to church and our fun activities. You will be amazed at what the Lord can do in your life if you are deliberate in your prayers. Duplicate two index cards by placing the same names on both, keep one of the cards and personally pray, and bring the other to church and the prayer group at Church will pray over them as well. We already have two people that have been affected by this effective tool. In closing scripture says, "The effectual fervent prayer of the righteous has great power in its working' (James 5:16b). Let us make an impact upon this Salida community for Christ!


