As the lenten season is upon us, I have had more and more people inquiring what is it all about.

Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days. Lent is marked by fasting, both from food and festivities.

Whereas Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus after his death on the cross, Lent recalls the events leading up to, and including Jesus' crucifixion by Rome. The Christian churches that observe Lent in the 21st century (and not all do significantly) use it as a time for prayer and penance. Only a small number of people today fast for the whole of Lent, although some maintain the practice on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. It is more common these days for believers to surrender a particular vice such as favorite food or habit. Whatever the sacrifice, it is a reflection of Jesus' deprivation in the wilderness and a test of self-discipline.

But why 40 days? 40 is a significant number in Jewish-Christian scripture: In Genesis, the flood which destroyed the earth was brought about by 40 days and nights of rain. The Hebrews spent 40 years in the wilderness before reaching the land promised to them by God. Moses fasted for 40 days before receiving the ten commandments on Mount Sinai. Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness in preparation for his ministry. And most Christians regard Jesus' time in the wilderness as the key event for the duration of Lent.

So why is it called Lent? Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen.' Lent is observed in the spring, when the days begin to get longer. The color purple is the symbolic color used in some churches throughout Lent, for drapes and altar frontals. And purple is used for two reasons: first, because the color purple is associated with mourning and so anticipates the pain and suffering of the crucifixion, while secondly because purple is also the color associated with royalty, and celebrates Christ's resurrection and sovereignty over death and the grave.

So what can we do to make this time more meaningful for our Christian walk? All of us lead lives so filled with the demands of work and family that little time is left to us to cultivate the garden of our spiritual lives. In our preoccupation with the ceaseless business of life, our spirit, if not



completely forgotten, is often sadly neglected. When we do find the time to look at ourselves honestly, we soon discover that the spirit of the world has gradually and imperceptibly eaten away at our good intentions; we have become shopworn by the cares and self-centered spirit of the world.

Fortunately for us, the church recognized from its earliest days that we would need regular periods of reflection and renewed effort if we were to free ourselves from the relentless grip of worldly cares, to once again imitate the example of Christ and reflect it in our lives. It did so by developing the season of Lent, a season which invites us to renew our concentration on prayer, fasting, and giving, which lie at the very heart of Christian living.

Through the discipline of quiet prayer, we acknowledge and affirm the sovereignty of Almighty God in our lives, and in doing so, we surrender the notion of living according to the principle of power; we accept that we are not the measure of all things. In the practice of fasting, we seek to overcome the power that material things have gained over us; we strive to be servants of the sacred and not merely masters of the material and profane. Finally, we are called to give, through which we share the fruits of our labor with those in need, and so surrender our natural tendency to be self seeking. Prayer which unites us to God, fasting which curbs our ceaseless desires, giving, which allows us to actively love our neighbor as ourselves --- these are the transforming gifts of Lent.

But if they are to convey their wonderful grace, however, we must make them the tools by which we deepen and enrich our faith and relationship to Jesus Christ. That, truly, is what it means to be a Christian. The wisdom of the ages invites us once again to this marvelous opportunity to find God in our lives; so let us take care that we not waste it.





The Covid 19 Pandemic has affected everyone in one way or another. In regard to our Church, in-person Church Services, Bible Study, committee meetings, etc. were put on hold. But on a positive note, Church Services began being live streamed on Facebook, giving those who were still not comfortable with in-house services, to experience the Church service at home, while still feeling connected.

To assist in that endeavor, there was the opportunity to enhance audio and video systems within the Sanctuary. The sound system was upgraded, two new TV monitors were installed, so that the Order of Worship and the words to the music are displayed, making for a safer experience. This was all made possible by the generous donations towards these projects.

Another large project that was completed during this time was the fence around the back lot.

Grimbleby-Coleman Accounting firm did a review of the Church's books, and I am pleased to share that everything was found to be in good financial order.

With regard to the 2020 budget, expenses came in under budget. Actual Income vs. expenses, ended up in the black. The financial report was provided in more detail at the Annual Church Meeting, which was held February 14, 2021. The financial report was included in the 2020 Annual Report that was available for all Church members.

During the annual meeting, there was a question that was asked, "Where does the money go, when someone gives an offering in memory of someone." And the simple answer is this...into the General Fund unless it has been specifically designated. These funds are then used to pay the regular expenses of the church, i.e. salaries, taxes, insurance, utilities, janitorial, alarm system, landscaping, etc.

With that being said, if, at any time, you wish to contribute to a particular fund, you may do so by writing your wishes in the subject area of your check. And some examples are:

- Christian Education
- Deacons
- Benevolence fund
- Sanctuary Improvements
- Building Maintenance
- Missionary in Haiti, etc.
- Memorial Tile fund
- Memorial Dinner fund
- Christmas fund

Designated funds can be earmarked for any special Church project and will not go into the general fund.

In-person Church services has resumed and safety measures wearing masks and social distancing is being practiced.

With the Grace of God and all of your generous offerings, financially 2020 was a great success.

She looked forward to game nights with family, playing Bunco with friends, actively participated in both the First Congregational Church of Salida and online services and bible study with the Durham Community-United Methodist Church. Her family grieves her loss, but they take comfort knowing that Miles and Sharon are together again. She is survived by her son Todd, (Robin). Daughter Kelly, (Steve), Granddaughters Ashley, Caitlin, Hannah, Great grandson Casey, and her sister Maureen. The family is choosing to remember Sharon in a way that will honor her spirt when it is safe for everyone to gather and share stories.



Sharon was instrumental in leading to the success of the Outreach Committee. It flourished under her leadership.

We became involved in Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child, putting together shoeboxes to be distributed around the world spreading the Gospel.

Sharon was also liturgist for Sunday service. She was also instrumental, with Lena Wyeth, in starting the churches prayer group.

JoAnn Tamura passed away peacefully on February 5, 2021 at the age of 82. Jo Ann was born in Sacramento on January 3, 1939 to Hideko

and Fred Tamura. Her father passed away when Jo Ann was only 10 months old. In 1942, during the start of World War II, JoAnn and her mother were relocated to an Internment Camp in Colorado for approximately 2 years. After the war, JoAnn and her mother returned to Modesto, where Hideko worked as a legal secretary before passing away in 1965 when JoAnn was 25. After graduating from Modesto High and after attending MJC, JoAnn worked for 37 years in the Records Department at the old Scenic Hospital.

JoAnn loved to travel and visited Japan, Bangkok, Singapore, China, New Zealand, Australia, and Fiji. JoAnn also traveled throughout the United States and Hawaii and she loved to take many bus trips throughout California, with MJC and other organizations. In her retirement, JoAnn enjoyed volunteering at the Gallo Center for the Arts, and held long time memberships in the Modesto Garden Club, Red Hat Society, and participated in many MICL classes.

JoAnn was a member of the First Congregational Church of Salida since 1950, and had many friendships there. She is survived by many cousins and relatives of the Kiyoi and Tamura families and many dear friends from her various activities.

JoAnn's family would like to thank the staff at Casa de Modesto for their loving and dedicated caregiving and support the past three years.

JoAnn had a very good and fulfilling life. On one trip with her mother, they met another mother and daughter. JoAnn became pen pals with the daughter. The friend became an airline flight attendant. They corresponded for over 50 years. JoAnn's last piece of correspondence was a Christmas card last December from her friend. She also had an Irish pen pal. This piece of JoAnn's life was revealed when Mike and Suki were moving things from JoAnn's place at Casa de Modesto.

And speaking of travels, JoAnn loved to go on excursions with Modesto Junior College, Modesto Garden Club, and Red Hat Society. She was a faithful contributor to our Grapevine newsletter, always writing about these trips.

Many of you know that JoAnn rode the bus to get places as she did not drive. She rode the bus to work. How many of us can say that or can say they have very rode public transportation to get somewhere. JoAnn rode the bus to do her laundry. She rode the bus to Fellowship Lunches loaded with shopping bags. She also relied on friends for rides many times, but her primary mode of transportation was the bus. And, when she moved to Casa de Modesto she figured out how to use Uber.

JoAnn may not have drove, but she certainly got around town. Whenever there was a soft opening for a new restaurant in town, you could count on JoAnn to be there. She knew the happenings of our town. Guess it must have been her curiosity about the things around her, and the wherewithal to ask what the haps were. She was definitely the "gal about town" without knowing she was.



### **MY FAVORITE HYMN**

As requested by Florence Velthoen The Story behind "It is Well with My Soul".

This hymn was written as a poem by Horatio P. Spafford. The music was composed for this poem by Phillip Bliss and first published in *Gospel Songs No. 2* by Ira Sankey and Phillip Bliss in 1876.

Spafford was a success lawyer, Presbyterian Church elder, and land developer in Chicago starting in the 1860's. In 1871, he suffered one personal tragedy - the death of his 4-year old son to a fever – and one professional tragedy - many of his real estate holdings were destroyed in the Great Chicago Fire of October of that year. He began to rebuild his real estate, but in 1873 decided he would take his family (wife and four daughters) to England to assist his friend D.L. Moody as he preached across England.

He arranged passage for himself and his family aboard the steamship S.S. *Ville du Havre*. Pressing business matters forced Spafford to delay his leaving, so he sent his family as scheduled with the intent of following a few days later. On the night of November 22, 1873, the steamship collided with another ship and sank in 12 minutes. The four daughters – eleven-year-old Annie, nine-year-old Maggie, five-year-old Bessie, and two-year-old Tanette were all lost. His wife Anna was found hours later clinging to a piece of wreckage; she was the only survivor from the family. Anna sent a telegram to her husband saying: "Saved alone, what shall I do?" 226 passengers died in the sinking of the ship.

Spafford immediately left for England. The captain of his ship called Horatio to the deck to show him the area where the family's ship sank. According to daughter Bertha Spafford Vester, born later in life after the tragedy, it was after this incident as his voyage continued that he wrote the poem we know as "It Is Well with My Soul".

He and his wife returned to Chicago to rebuild their lives. They had three more children – daughters Bertha, Grace, and a son, Horatio. But again, tragedy struck when the boy died at age four. To further their misfortunes, their Presbyterian church regarded their continuing and profound tragedies as divine punishment and shunned the family. So, in 1881, Spafford sold all his holdings, his house and furnishing and set out for Jerusalem. There, with 13 adults and 3 children he established what became known as The American Colony.

Later, they were joined by others who chose to serve the poor of Jerusalem without regard to religion – Christian, Jews and Arabs were all served by the colony, providing food, shelter and an orphanage for people of all religions. Horatio and Anna even adopted a young orphan boy from a Turkish Jewish background. Horatio died of malaria on October 16, 1888, and was buried in the Mount Zion Cemetery. The American Colony continued to serve the area until the end of WWI.

The student body is small but diverse and comprises members of each of the US armed forces. Graduates of SAMS are colloquially known as 'Jedi Knights'." This extra schooling will extend their stay at the college for another year, but the additional education will provide John with many opportunities for advancement in his Army career.

Dan and Cindy traveled to Fort Leavenworth over the Labor Day weekend to meet their new grand-daughter and visit with John and Denise. The family was able to come home for Christmas for a visit. They are also planning a trip to Modesto during late June when John gets a break from classes as

he transitions from CGSC to SAMS. Hopefully to timing will work so we can celebrate the approach of Eleanor's first birthday.

While here over the Christmas break, John was notified of his promotion to Major. This is a big step in his Army career, transitioning from a lower level officer to a Field Grade Officer. Soon after his return to the college was pinned with his "Oak Leaves", signifying his rank of Major. Congratulations to John and his family on a very successful and fulfilling year.


