Have you ever heard anyone say this before? "I love Jesus, but I don't do church."

This is the beginning of a conversation that I have had countless times with people of all different ages, backgrounds and experiences.

As well as: "I'm a Christian, but I don't have to go to church in order to love Jesus."

Now our salvation is not based on our works or church attendance. But it's also true that when we surrender our lives to Him, we naturally desire to learn more about Him, to be a part of the body of Christ and to be held accountable and pointed toward sanctification. We are called to live out an active faith.

One of my favorite verses is 2 Corinthians 5:17, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. Old things have passed away, behold, all things have become new." So when we truly repent, surrender and choose to follow Jesus, we are given a new heart, one that desires godliness and holiness. We are given the opportunity to make the daily choice to leave our past lives behind us and move forward toward the righteous life that He has set out for us.

Another favorite of mine is, "If anyone claims to live in Christ, he must walk as He did" (1 John 2:6).

I have watched people who claim to love Jesus hurt the people around them deeply. I have witnessed affairs, divorce, hypocrisy, greed and excessive pride. I have watched some of our closest friends walk away from the church for the reasons stated above and many more. I have seen deep hurt caused by the church and have watched faithful churchgoers turn bitter, angry or broken because of the way these events occurred.

I want to ensure you that I'm not sitting behind a computer screen, lacking empathy or compassion towards the hurt that many have likely felt. It's all very real, and I have felt it too. And I am also not ignoring the fact that the church is full of sinful people, nor that there is hard pain and baggage to come along with it. But I am simply turning my eyes to Jesus, the author and perfecter of my faith and my hope. I have made the choice to not allow the sinful, broken people of the church (those

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who look just like me) not to be a stumbling block that keeps me away from my sinless, perfect and loving Heavenly Father who simply wants to draw us to Himself.

The church isn't primarily a building or a set of programs or events. It's a family. A broken family, yes. But a family all-the-more, seeking God to love more, serve more and share light in a super, super dark world. And we see throughout the Bible that Christ Himself was part of the church. His apostles were as well. And remember this from our Hebrews study? "Let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near" (Heb. 10:24-25).


The apostle Paul said, "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit. For the body does not consist of one member but of many" (1 Cor. 12:12-14). He also said, "So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up" (Eph. 4:11-12), while one more time he says, "You were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord" (1 Cor. 1:9).

I fully understand that the 'American Church' may not be what Christ had in mind. And we must be wise and discerning when choosing a church to ensure that it is bible-believing and bible-teaching. But although some church buildings themselves may not be the same as the church in Jesus' day, it is still made up of people who love the Lord (although imperfectly) and come together to hear His word. While the contextualization has changed, the mission remains the same – to glorify God and

make disciples. Though the way we do things now may look a little different than first century Rome, it's the same mission and strategy that propels us forward; assembling for worship, connecting in community, training up disciples.

I can almost hear some of your thoughts as I type this:

- Our worship is too cheesy and old fashioned.
- The pastor isn't available enough.
- I have too much going on in my life.
- My husband/wife doesn't want to go so I don't go.
- People aren't welcoming.
- It's an awkward experience.
- It's not the church that Jesus designed it to be.
- Having kids makes it too hard to get there.
- And, of course, the most popular: Church is a corporate design




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created by man for the consumption of money; it is a place which promotes religion rather than faith and relationship.

-And there's way too many more.

I've heard it all before. And, to be honest, many of these things I have thought myself. I'm not above the doubt or scrutiny, either. But, you guys, how will we fix what is broken in the church or help the people of the church if we refuse to be a part of it? If you evaluate your life today, are you choosing busyness or bitterness over worship? We can sit behind the scenes criticizing or we can live out an active faith — serving and getting involved — making real changes, loving on real people, living life alongside real pain.



The Enemy is strategic. He has come to steal, kill and destroy your faith, a relationship with God and relationship with other believers. So if we constantly choose sleeping in on Sundays and breakfast with our family over church, if we choose a night out drinking, line-dancing, or karaoke over genuine community, sharing real life with one another and holy living, then we aren't making a difference in the church that we may or may not see so many problems with. But we're simply allowing the issues that we feel so strongly about to perpetuate as we carelessly look on.

I've witnessed church-hopping, where people treat church like Goldilocks treated beds. People want that "just right" perfect-feeling church, but when they can't find it, they simply walk away. All the enemy had to do is distract them. But to that I say: Choose a place and stick with it. You'll never find perfect. We should not be looking at what we can get from the church, our hearts should be set on what we can give the church, and to God.

And as a reminder, the enemy has the power to use both good and bad things to keep you from God things – but only if you let him. He uses distraction, bitterness, hard-heartedness, pride, awkwardness and even feel good/treat yourself days to his advantage.

C.S. Lewis said it perfectly: "The perfect church service would be the one we were almost unaware of; our attention would have been on God. But every novelty prevents this. It fixes our attention on the service itself; and thinking about worship is a different thing than worshipping. It is mad idolatry that makes the service greater than the god."

Dear friends, God is the focus of the church. The service nor the people need to be perfect for you to hear His life-changing word. True life change happens in the church. We truly grow when we connect with every day people, pour into them and allow them to pour into us.

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
The local church, led by Jesus, is the hope of the world and God's means to disciple the nations and hasten his return. Matthew 16:18 says, "...On this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

So how can we despise or resent the church when Jesus not only said He was going to build it, but that He would use it to storm the gates of hell? That's something I want to be a part of! Don't you?

It's true that there are churches out there which have fallen into the trap of trying to accumulate numbers rather than turning hearts toward God. But this isn't the healthy church that God intended for it to be. A bible-believing, bible-teaching church comes together as a reminder that we can only experience fruitful mission when we are fully abiding in and drawing strength from the true vine (John 15). His word is our daily bread.

And in a world offering countless different perspectives, there is one place that people can find truth (John 8:26). The church is a lighthouse in an ethical and immoral fog (Matthew 5:14–16). So if you claim to know and love God, yet do not have a desire to be a part of His church, I lovingly implore you to evaluate your relationship with Him. Get in His word and read what He has to say about His calling for us.

People, there are one hundred or more things that we could do that would hinder us from sharing life with God's people, and if you're hesitant, I challenge you to choose intentionality and join in worshiping God this weekend! I promise you that as many reasons as you might have not to go, there are even more reasons to trust God and pour your life and heart out for Him alongside His people.

The Trustees need to discern whether or not having a preschool should be brought to the congregation or not. There are several things which need to be addressed such as:


- Are our facilities able to accommodate a preschool? What we might have to do to get State approval?


Get into the Christmas Spirit... Our 7th Annual Women's Christmas Tea will be held on Saturday, 2 December 2023, in our Fellowship Hall.



Founded in 1968, The Manteca Youth Focus (MYF) competition philosophy is to develop and empower youth in order to help them become well-rounded, optimistic and motivated young people with a strong desire to be the best they can be in order to make meaningful contributions in their community. The combination of guiding and developing young people's character, ability, intellect, and volunteer services constantly challenge them to "reach for the stars."

The Board of Directors of Manteca Youth Focus (MYF) are united in their belief that all youth should have the opportunity to assist young leaders in the pursuit of higher education, develop personal talents, and provide services throughout the community. The program evolved to add the "Community Advocacy Project" speech phase which challenges all youth participants across all age divisions to develop a platform to address an issue in the community for which they would like to have a positive impact.

Marcus, Yannis, and Charis Ang have been participating and volunteering in various community projects for the last several years. They were overjoyed to have won a number of prizes during the competitions based on their age categories. Each phase of competition is assigned a percentage. These percentage factors are graded according to academic achievements, personality interview, communicative skills, stage arts, volunteer services, and community advocacy speech.

Yannis won the title of the Miss Young Manteca of 2023. She has high regard and gratitude for our service men and women who are away from their families. She initiated "Sweet Treats for Troops" (STT) advocacy project to fulfill one of her duties serving as Miss Young Manteca. STT is a project that provides candies/sweets to the military troops. To accomplish this, she would like to carry out a fund raising project to purchase candies/sweets and to cover the costs of packaging/shipping to the military troops. She personally designs and hand makes various unique and beautiful bracelets to all donors. Her goal is to raise \$500 before December 1, 2023 in order to have sufficient time as a Christmas favor to the military troops.







My Favorite Hymn "Be Thou My Vision"

Around the year 433, High King Logaire of Ireland decreed that no fires should be lit before the start of the pagan Spring Festival. However, since it was Easter, Patrick (later Saint Patrick) lit a fire atop Slane Hill to mark the beginning of the Holy Week. King Logaire was so impressed with Patrick's devotion that he forgave Patrick and recognized him as the first Christian missionary to Ireland. So what does this have to do with the hymn "Be Thou my Vision"? The tune that this hymn was eventually set to is called "Slane", after the hill. No one knows who wrote the tune, but it originated in the area so it was named after the hill and the devoted act of Patrick.

The words to the hymn are believed to have come from a poem written by Saint Fallan, a 6th century Celtic monk and follower of St Columba. We don't have any original copies of the poem, but a copy from the 14th century. So you can see the basis for the hymn is very, very old.

Written in the original old Irish, the first verse looks like this:

Rob tu mo bhoile a Comdi cride. Ni ni nech aile, acht ri secht nime

It wasn't until 1905 when a linguist named Mary Byrne used a literal translation to yield this first verse:

Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart. None other is aught but the King of the seven heavens.

But it wasn't until 1912 when Eleanor M. Hull, in her Poem Book of the Gael created a metrical, poetic version of Byrne's work in sixteen rhymed couplets that have been used by editors to build the version of the four (or 5) stanza hymn so widely treasured today. (More on the 5th verse later.) Now the first verse is more familiar:

Be Thou my Vision, O Lord of my heart; Naught be all else to me, save that Thou art. Thou my best Thought, by day or by night, Waking or sleeping, Thy presence my light.

Concurrently, Patrick W. Joyce published the traditional tune SLANE (remember the hill). Thus paired with the English text, the "Be Thou My Vision" is sung today first appeared in the Irish Church Hymnal in 1919.

The 5th or "middle verse" is often overlooked in current hymnals, but included in some modern versions:

Be thou my breastplate, my sword for the fight Be thou my armor, and be thou my might Thou my soul's shelter, and thou my high tow'r Raise thou me heav'nward, o pow'r of my pow'r

It is interesting to note that Saint Fallan went blind as he grew older but before completing his poem. With that in mind, "Be Thou my Vision" takes on a whole new meaning.



It is a great thrill to see that the Holy Spirit working inside the institution through those that are living there.

Our service at Southfork continues to grow. The men there are actively working to reach the camp with the good news of Jesus Christ. The men are meeting daily for prayer and devotionals as they recognize God's call upon their lives. I admire their fervor and desire to be used of God.


At OSCI, we also are seeing active outreach among the men. Joe has been bringing his cellmate, and got him signed up for the prisoner discipleship institute program. If an individual completes that entire program, they will have answered some 38,000 questions about the Bible. In the month of September, we prayed with 15 people to receive Christ.


