Many people have asked me in the past, pastor, what is the Essence of Membership? Well, our Lord Jesus specified one defining mark for his disciples, while of course, there are many marks of true discipleship, but one mark is singled out as signifying to the watching world that we belong to Christ: “A new commandment I give you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another” (John 13:34–35)

So the mark of Christian discipleship is love—love of the kind that Jesus exercised toward his followers, love visible enough that people will recognize it as belonging to those people who follow Jesus.

Not surprisingly, then, a healthy Christian is one who is committed to expressing this kind of love toward other Christians. And where would be the best place for Christians to love this way, would be in the assembly of God’s people called the local church. Is it no wonder then that the author of Hebrews instructs us to “consider how to stir up one another to love and good works,” and then right away says “not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near” (Heb. 10:24–25)? Faithful church attendance is associated tightly with stirring each other to love and good deeds. The local church is the place where love is most visibly and compellingly displayed among God’s people. It’s where the “body of Christ” is most plainly represented in the world.

Now God intends for all of us to contribute to the mission of the local church and experience profound spiritual growth as a result. So, we want to explore the question, “What does a committed church member look like?” within the relation to the essential command and mark of love. So here are some of the ways that committed membership expresses itself.

Attends Regularly

And this is the first and most important ministry of every Christian in the local church. Being present, being known, and being active are the only ways to make Christian love possible.

One Who Seeks Peace

A committed church member is committed to the maintenance of peace in the congregation. “Let us pursue what makes for peace and mutual upbuilding” (Rom. 14:19). “And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace” (James 3:18).

One Who Edifies Others

The one consistent purpose or goal of the public meeting of the church is mutual edification, building each other up in the faith. Paul writes, “And He gave some as apostles, and some as prophets, and some as evangelists, and some as pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of service, to the building up of the body of Christ; until we all attain to the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a mature man, to the measure of the stature which belongs to the fullness of Christ. As a result, we are no longer to be children, tossed here and there by waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by the trickery of men, by craftiness in deceitful scheming; but speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in all aspects into Him who is the head, even Christ, from whom the whole body, being fitted and held together by what every joint supplies, according to the proper working of each individual part, causes the growth of the body for the building up of itself in love. (Eph. 4:11–16). So, a healthy and committed member comes to serve, not just to be served. Jesus said, “For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many” (Mark 10:45). And so, if our Lord came to serve, so how much more should we? We need to be providers, while not always being consumers only.

We Need to Warn and Admonishes Others

A committed member is committed to speaking the truth in love to his brothers and sisters, to helping them avoid pitfalls, and to encouraging them in holiness and Christian joy. A committed member will not be wrongly intrusive in the lives of others— a busybody—but he also will not be “hands off” when it comes to caring for and counseling others.

Pursues Reconciliation

Christians are people who are reconciled to God through Christ. As a consequence, we have been given “the ministry of reconciliation” (2 Cor. 5:18–21). So, a committed member strives to repair breaches as quickly as possible, even before continuing in public worship. Jesus said, “Therefore if you are presenting your offering at the altar, and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your offering there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother, and then come and present your offering” (Matt. 5:23–24). And where this is something that we need to be continually doing, at the beginning of communion is a good time of practice.

Bears with Others

Ministers of reconciliation must be patient and long-suffering. They must be characterized by meekness such that they do not think more highly of themselves than they ought (Matt. 5:5). They must hold up under the weight of disappointments, loss, frustrations, attack, slander, and offense (Matt. 18:21–22; Rom. 15:1). By carrying each other’s burdens, we fulfill the law of Christ (Gal. 6:2). And isn’t it funny; we desire everyone to bear with our faults but we don’t have that same spirit of grace for others. Something to think about.

Prepares for the Ordinances

One privilege of church membership is participating in Christ's ordinances— baptism and communion. Moreover, these privileges give us visible proclamations of the good news that Christ died for sinners and rose again to eternal life. So, it's a great tragedy that many Christians neglect the ordinances that Jesus himself established 2,000 years ago. A committed member rejoices at the baptism of new believers, and he examines his own heart in preparation for joining the family of God at the Lord's Table. He receives these spiritual exercises as means of grace, means that give visible testimony to the effect of the gospel in his life and the life of the gathered church.

Supports the Work of the Ministry

A committed member gives resources, time, and talent to the furtherance of the gospel in the local church. He lives out the Bible's call to the body of Christ. "We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If a man's gift is prophesying, let him use it in proportion to his faith. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously; if it is leadership, let him govern diligently; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully" (Rom. 12:6–8). A healthy, committed church member receives and applies the grace of God by working to support the ministry of the local church and excels in giving what he has already received from God to the gospel work. He should follow the example of the Macedonians, who committed to a financial giving strategy that was sacrificial, generous, increasing over time, and fueled by faith in God despite present circumstances (2 Cor. 8–9). What do we have that we did not first receive from God? What do we have that we should not be willing to give back to him in worship?

Conclusion

To fail to associate ourselves in a lasting and committed way with the Head of the church by joining his body is surely a sign of ingratitude, whether from an uninformed or a dull heart. We who have the privilege of living in countries where we may freely join a local church should keep this admonition from Dietrich Bonhoeffer in mind: It is by the grace of God that a congregation is permitted to gather visibly in this world to share God's Word and sacrament. Not all Christians receive this blessing. The imprisoned, the sick, the scattered lonely, the proclaimers of the Gospel in heathen lands stand alone. They know that visible fellowship is a blessing. They remember, as the Psalmist did, how they went "with the multitude . . . to the house of God, with the voice of joy and praise, with a multitude that kept holy the day (Ps. 42:4) . . . Therefore, let him who until now has had the privilege of living in common Christian life with other Christians praise God's grace from the bottom of his heart. Let him thank God on his knees and declare: It is grace, nothing but grace, that we are allowed to live in community with Christian brethren. And remember....it takes a congregation!

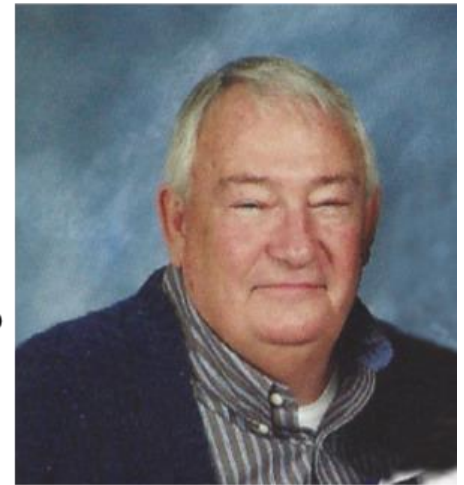

DARROL TUGGLE

October 8, 1939



Darrol Gene Tuggel was born October 8, 1939, in Granby Missouri, to Joseph and Viola Tuggle, the youngest of eight children. He grew up in Salida, attended Salida Elementary School, graduating from Modesto High School in 1957. His mother was Postmistress of the Salida Post Office for many years.

From an early age, he was passionate about swimming. He was asked to be on the high school swim team when the coach saw him swim underwater from one end of the pool to the other. Darrol was not trying to impress the coach, but the girls during a free swim time after school. He won many awards and medals during his years on the swim team.

On October 7, 1957, he enlisted in the Navy and was assigned to the USS Wasp, touring Cuba and Bermuda. They also searched for Russian submarines during the Cold War. He mustered out in 1960, receiving an Honorable Discharge in 1963, having been on Inactive Reserve.

In December 1952, he married Sandy Funk. Their first son, Mark, was born in January 1965, followed by a second son, Todd, in February 1967.

He coached Bel Passi Baseball during the years the boys played baseball. He enjoyed water skiing, bowling, and abalone diving in Mendocino. Throughout his life, he was an avid fisherman with family and friends.



Darrol was a member of our church for 25 years. He greatly enjoyed singing in the choir. When the Choir Director organized a few members who played instruments into a playing group, Darrol joined in as a trombonist. He also played in Gottschalks Community Band with Ernie Bucio.

After 36 years, Darrol retired from Moore Business Forms.

2 Timothy 4:7-8, says "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept faith..." And after his long battle heart disease, and more recently with multiple myeloma, Darrol crossed the "finish line" on August 2, with his family by his side.

He is survived by his wife of 59 years, Sandy, and sons Mark and Todd, Todd's wife, Amy and their daughter Hayley, as well as a large extended family. And, of course, the family dog, Petey, who Darrol took for rides in his pickup as Petey rode "shotgun".

A memorial luncheon to celebrate Darrol's life was held on Saturday, August 13, in our Fellowship Hall, to a standing room only crowd. A private burial was held on Monday, August 22, at the San Joaquin Valley National Cemetery in Santa Nella.

My Favorite Hymns ***Eternal Father, Strong to Save***

Dedicated to Darrol Tuggle

Written in 1860 by William Whiting, this hymn was adopted by the US Naval Academy in about 1879, and soon by the entire service. Today it is known simply as *The Navy Hymn*.

William Whiting was an Anglican Church minister. As headmaster of the Winchester College Choristers' School, he wrote this song, based on Psalm 107, verses 23 to 26.

The tune was written in 1861 by John B. Dykes, also Anglican clergy, and was published in the hymnal *Hymns, Ancient and Modern* in 1861.

The original first verse of the hymn was recorded as:

Eternal Father, strong to save,
Whose arm hath bound the restless wave,
Who bidd'st the mighty ocean deep
Its own appointed limits keep;
Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee,
For those in peril on the sea!

The hymn was also used by the Royal Navy, being popular sometime around 1890. The original words in subsequent verse were changed to better suit the Navy's culture. Indeed, verses were often changed or added to adapt to changing technology and to customize it for use by various branches.

In 1962, a verse was added to the hymn to honor and protect astronauts by J.E. Volonte:

Eternal Father, King of birth,
Who didst create the heaven and earth,
And bid the planets and the sun
Their own appointed orbits run;
O hear us when we seek thy grace
For those who soar through outer space.

Several more verses have been written to honor the US Marine Corps, The US Coast Guard, Merchant Marines, submariners, and military families left at home.

Today, the hymn is sung at ship commissioning and funerals honoring sailors and soldiers.

US Presidents so honored were FD Roosevelt, JF Kennedy, RM Nixon, GR Ford. The hymn was played for sailors lost when the USS Maine was sunk in 1898 and the USS Cole in 2000.

The hymn has also been used by the Royal Navy for years at dedications and funerals. Most notably it was sung at the funerals of Lord Mountbatten and Prince d Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh, and husband of Queen Elizabeth.

It will continue to be sung at funerals for any sailor, airman, or soldier as this hymn embodies memories of their service, their patriotism and their hopes.

Now after all this he is leaving in 5 days for Ft. Bragg to train for the best squad competition. I am pooped just from writing all this but now I know you will see why I am so proud. This took a lot of training, stamina and discipline.

Now his brother, Brad, is a champ in his own right. He can't go to the lengths Tyler did since he is the father of two beautiful children, but he also is in the National Guard and has taken #1 in every marksmanship "contest" he is involved in.

I tell you; these Holloway boys are pretty special.

I would seek unto God, and unto God would I commit my cause: Which doeth great things and unsearchable; marvelous things without number:

Job 5:8-9

Dear Pastors, Families, and Friends,

God indeed does great and marvelous things without number, and is so trustworthy when we commit our cause to him. August began with the Rock of Ages conference in South Carolina. It was such wonderful encouragement to see God moving in and through the lives of His people. Although I can not adequately describe the things that happened, they certainly were great, marvelous, and without number.

The Gospel tracts we had printed for the inmates to distribute have begun to pay great dividends. The most recent service at OSCI required us to get additional chairs and songbooks for the men who just kept coming in. I look forward to ordering additional tracts as most of my facilities have given them all out.

While training the men to proclaim the Gospel using their testimony, I passed out a worksheet which helps organize the elements of their testimony. The following week a man brought it back and said, "Do I give this to you?" I asked him to give his testimony in service that day. It was so exciting to hear him boldly tell his story of coming to know Christ. Two men prayed to receive Christ after hearing his testimony.

After using this same worksheet at Southfork, one of my most faithful men stayed behind and said, "I don't have a testimony of praying to receive Christ. I've been in church my whole life but never did that." I said, maybe you were young and have forgotten. He said, "I think that's something I would remember." He prayed to receive Christ then and there. In total we have prayed with 12 inmates to receive Christ this month.

We received 375 Christmas Stockings this month from some ladies in California. We expect to receive an additional 864 that have been made by another group of ladies. These amazing blessings will probably meet our need for this year. I would love to get any additional stocking you have made, as they will be needed in the future. Thank you for all you do for the prisoners of the Northwest.

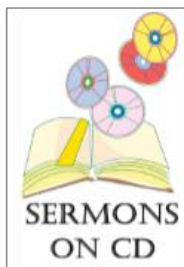
