

As our church is growing both spiritually and numerically, and as you are looking to be plugged in to help in this churches mission, please begin to pray where the Lord would lead you to serve here at our church. A healthy church is one where every member of the body utilizes their God-given gifts for the kingdom. And for those of you who are already serving in the church, here are some necessary tools to aide you in that endeavor.

Serving in ministry is something that grows you closer to Christ while allowing you to realize the Gospel in the lives of others. As someone who has committed to a specific ministry, you need to do more than just "show up" on the weekend. Your service over the weekend should be an over-flow of what God is doing through you in the week.

Just like they do in the popular kids' program, Sesame Street, these encouraging words are sponsored by a specific letter—P. And here are 7 "P's" to help you in your service in the church.

Prayer

Pray for those you will be serving. Many people come to church for the first time, or for the first time in a long time, for two reasons: curiosity or crisis. If you are representing the church in your service, how you interact with them will be a reflection of the Gospel in their eyes. You have no way of knowing when this will happen or with whom, so praying in advance sets your heart in the right place for when the moment arrives. Prayer also helps you put things in the proper perspective. You are a conduit through which God loves others; you are not the source, but if you do not pray and ask God to empower you to serve others, you set yourself up to carry the load on your own. Prayer reminds us who works through us to love others.

Prepare

Whether you teach children, greet people at the door, serve in the kitchen, or lead worship, you have some preparation to do. Do not shirk it. Read the lesson. Learn the music. Practice smiling in the mirror. Do whatever you need to do so that you show up ready to serve, while being confident in what you are doing.

Pick Up

Make sure you show up early enough to get ready. When you arrive at your place of service, make sure and pick up anything you need. If you prepare, you will be able to spot anything that is missing or needs adjusting. Remember, that anyone you ask to help you to get ready, is putting off getting ready themselves.

Pursue Relationships

Get to know the people you are serving, as well as the people with whom you are serving. The Church is not an organization performing tasks, it is a community doing life together. Build friendships, sit together in worship, get coffee or fellowship with each other during the week. Serving together for a common purpose is one of the best ways to build deep and lasting relationships.

Participate

When you are there, be present. Put away your smartphone, unless you use it as part of your service. If you suffer from FOMO (fear of missing out), then apply it to your service. Fear missing out on what God does in some else's life. If you are in children's ministry, sing the songs they sing. Do not stand like a guard on the perimeter. If your student ministry does silly games for icebreakers, do them. Delayed gratification, or even a little embarrassment on your part, can make a big difference in the life of someone you are serving.

Put Away

The old saying "your mother does not work here, clean-up after yourself" is a fun one, and it applies here. Put the supplies you use away, pick up any trash you see on the floor. Help stack chairs. Throw away the coffee cup someone left behind. Do your part to leave everything better than the way you found it. Do not assume clean-up is someone else's job. If everyone pitches to in help, no one has to do very much.

Prayer

Didn't we already do this? Yes, but after you serve, bring it full circle. Pray for what God did in the lives of the people you encountered. Thank God for the chance to serve. Ask Him to reveal how you realized the Gospel today.





After the ordeal an old saying came to mind...if you fall, and people rush to help you, you are old, but if you fall and they just point and laugh, you are young....guess which response I received????

MY TRAVEL STORY

I always wanted to see the world but I didn't have any money so I got a job teaching military dependents overseas. The schools were run like stateside schools, same number of days, similar curriculum.

We signed a one or two year contract, actually a transportation agreement, (they'd transport us home) depending on the location. Most desirable places in Europe were two year areas, out of the way places like Okinawa and Ethiopia were one year spots.

My first assignment was Okinawa. I had to get out an atlas to find out where that was. In those days, 1966, it was an independent country south of Japan with many small islands around it. Now it's been taken over by Japan. It's about 80 miles long, 2 to 15 miles wide. There were 500 American teachers on that island when I was there, averaging 30 kids per teacher and their parents. That's a lot of dependents, not counting the many single men that were stationed there, and the fellows that came there for R&R (rest and relaxation.) Actually the island was crowded with their own people before the Americans came. There was one main road from North to South, Highway one. It was crowded with cars, motorcycles, and bikes, and if no more room they were on the wide sidewalks. We did have a military bus which made regular runs from my Base at Naha way down south, to the big BX (Base Exchange, like Walmart of today, it sold everything,) about half way up the island. Even though some were trying to speed it took forever to get a very short distance. Lee Unruh was there ask him about it.

I could go on and on, the humidity, the rust on my arm from the metal 'couch'... the cushions were clean, we had a maid, and geckos which kept the bugs down, lived in a quonset hut, but I taught in a brand new cement block bldg. My roommate taught in a quonset hut which lost a door in our first typhoon, but the children all made it home safely.

While there, every break we got we traveled, so visited Japan, Taiwan, India, Bangkok, Hong Kong, etc. and on weekends. took USO boat rides to the nearby islands.

From there I went to Germany, a small bath town, with a wonderful outdoor ice skating rink. My class had some problem children which I used to figuratively skate over, not figure skating. While there I visited most of Europe, Israel, Turkey, Russia, Greece, etc.

Next I went to Ethiopia, now Eritrea, independent, they were fighting for it then, so we weren't allowed off base after dark. Haille Selassie used to come to the base to go to the dentist and the kids would put on a program for him. My husband to be, was the choir director, and the quandary was how to direct the kids without turning his back to the emperor.

We visited some of Africa. It's a huge continent. One of my favorites was Lalaibella in Ethie, a church carved down out of the solid rock, something like Petra in Jordan. Also the weather was perfect, never got over 85, cooled down in the eve, desert, but a mile high so not hot like the sea level coastal area. To get down to sea level, one mile it took 7 miles of twists and turns, carsick road. but the disadvantage was the lack of water, military trucks would bring the families non drinking water to flush toilets, etc. and daddy would bring home drinkable water. This is before the days of bottled water.

Settled in England for 24 years, 5 different houses, and now in Salida for 25 years in the same house, but haven't stopped traveling. Taught my last year in Panama, another story.






